Strand 1: European Remembrance

The project examines civic contribution to the transition from dictatorship to democracy in 5 European countries: Germany (GDR), Greece, Hungary, Poland and (Czecho)Slovakia in the last decades of their totalitarian/authoritarian regimes, concentrating on specific aspects of citizens' fights in each country:

- 1. Fight for free speech, samizdat in Hungary;
- 2. Solidarity Trade Union in Poland;
- 3. Democratic movements helped by the Catholic and Lutheran Churches in the GDR (Germany) and (Czecho)Slovakia;
- **4.** Strikes and mass demonstrations of "Polytechneion" University in Greece.

A national and transnational civil dialogue is to be started about these past movements and about the threats to democratic achievements, civic rights and counterbalances in the present.

In the project, we provide a forum for young citizens with no living memories of the given era

- to make surveys with witnesses and video interviews with senior activists of the period;
- to raise awareness of the past among their peers;
- to promote democracy and freedom as active citizens.
